The focus of my presidency will be on leadership development-growing leaders within our esteemed organization and the profession. We continue to read about FCS unit closures and about other programs that have lost their autonomy as a result of having been merged into other colleges. That boggles my mind when I think of how much the world needs what we have to offer! I think of the coronavirus pandemic and how the work of FCS professionals has helped the global society to remain afloat. From flyers illustrating the proper way to wash our hands to YouTube videos demonstrating how to create face masks to webinars revealing how to remain connected in a socially distant world, it has been FCS professionals who have navigated us through this pandemic. There is now light at the end of the tunnel as more and more of us get vaccinated and take the booster shots. To stem the tide of FCS program closures, the Coalition must:

- Continue to demonstrate our relevance. We must show how the ills of today's society (such as bullying in schools and food insecurity) can be mitigated by the work of FCS professionals.
- Be at the table, rather than on the menu. The late Shirley Chisholm, American politician, educator and author, is credited with saying, "If they don't give you a seat at the table, bring a folding chair." What's our folding chair? Volunteering for committee service on our campuses. Writing letters to the editor in our campus and community newspapers. Letting our voices be heard in policy discussions. Talking to the person in line behind us at the grocery store. Posting substantive information on Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter.
- Recruit the next generation of FCS professionals. Participate in formal and informal
 recruitment activities. Set up a table at high school recruitment events. Volunteer to
 teach the Freshman Seminar courses on our campuses, or at least do guest lectures. Go
 to the cafeteria and interact with students in line to be served and those seated at tables
 near us. Let them know about the breadth and depth of opportunities in our field.
- **Position ourselves for leadership**. Throw our hats in the ring to be the next department chair or program leader. Run for office in our sororities or fraternities. Volunteer to chair that Strategic Planning Committee or that Accreditation Committee. Accept church leadership roles.

I end this message the same way I started it—in gratitude. I am grateful to be the Coalition's president at such a time as this. I am genuinely excited about what the future holds for the NCBDFCS! There is an African proverb that says, "If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together." I am thrilled to be on this journey with each of you to find out just how far we can go together in the National Coalition for Black Development in Family and Consumer Sciences! 
Legacy Award Recipient Dr. Shirley Hymon-Parker

Dr. Shirley Hymon-Parker is the 2021 Legacy Award recipient for the National Coalition for Black Development in Family and Consumer Sciences. Shirley Hymon-Parker, Ph.D., is associate dean for research for the College of Agriculture and Environmental Sciences.



Her research activities have extended to issues in childhood obesity, the value of undergraduate research, and rural entrepreneurship.

She served as chair of the Experiment Station Committee on Organization and Policy for APLU, and member Policy Board of Directors of the Board on Agriculture Assembly, chaired the 1890 Association of Research Directors, and served as director at large of the AAFCS. Edited by Vanessa Jackson, Jacqueline M. Holland, and Julia R. Miller Arline


