



Our Legacy: Dr. Lenora Moragne



While this organization had 11 foundering members, there was one member who stood out for being instrumental in bringing everyone together to establish the Coalition for Black Development in

Family & Consumer Sciences (NCBDFCS). This founding member was, Dr. Lenora Moragne. Dr. Moragne was born on September 29, 1931 in Evanston, IL and earned her B.S. in nutrition at Iowa State University, and her M.S. (1959) and Ph.D. (1969) degrees in nutrition from Cornell University.

Dr. Moragne's varied professional career, which spanned 60 years, included positions in hospitals, nutrition publishing, academia, and government. From 1977 to 1979, she served as Senator Bob Dole's legislative assistant, becoming the first African American woman to join The United States Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry as coordinator of nutrition policy for the Health and Human Services Division. In addition, Dr. Moragne was a voice for nutrition and dietetics policy as the Founding Editor and Publisher of three newsletters; Nutrition Legislation and Regulatory News, The Nutrition Funding Report, and the Black Congressional Monitor.

Dr. Moragne also served in many volunteer leadership roles throughout her career. She served on the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics Board of Directors from 1981 to 1984, she was President of the Society for Nutrition Education, Chairperson of the Food and Nutrition Section of the American Public Health Association, and she dedicated many years to leading the Coalition for Black Development in Family & Consumer Sciences.

Dr. Moragne passed away on April 1, 2020 as a great pioneer and leader in family & consumer sciences. Her legacy lives on through this organization and all the individuals and communities she touched.





Nominations for 2021 Coalition Awards: Deadline Extended

One of the major objectives of the Coalition is to identify and recognize the accomplishments of its members. To fulfill this objective, the following five (5) awards have been established:

Legacy Award

This award is given in recognition and appreciation for long standing, outstanding leadership, contributions, support and mentorship to the NCBDFCS and Family and Consumer Sciences Profession.

Outstanding Family & Consumer Sciences Professional

This award recognizes Family and Consumer Science professionals who have recently provided or currently are providing significant contributions to professional associations, or programs for youth and/or adults in their fields, communities, and/or states. Recipients of this award must have made significant contributions toward innovative, unique, and novel programs; and/or improvement, promotion, research or development of programs in Family and Consumer Sciences.

Outstanding New Family & Consumer Sciences Teacher

This award is meant to encourage new teachers to remain in the profession. Recipients of this award must have made significant contributions toward innovative, unique, and novel programs and have shown a profession commitment early in their careers. Individuals who are currently employed as fulltime classroom/laboratory teachers in an education program other than at the baccalaureate level are eligible for this award.

Outstanding Service Award

This award recognizes a Family and Consumer Sciences professional who has made the highest meritorious contributions to the improvement, promotion, development, and progress of Family and Consumer Sciences.

Outstanding Student Award

This award recognized a FCS student who has an exemplary record of scholarship, leadership, professional and community involvement. The individual must be an active member in a Family and Consumer Sciences student organization. In addition, the student is characterized by his/her service, loyalty, dependability, and professional promise in the field of Family and Consumer Sciences.



The Secret History of Home Economics: How Trailblazing Women Harnessed the Power of Home and Changed the Way We Live

People working in family and consumer sciences still contend with the “stitching and stirring” stereotype. But that assumption obscures the story of the revolutionary science of better living. Home economics exploded opportunities for women in the twentieth century by reducing domestic work and opening jobs as professors, engineers, chemists, and businesspeople. And it has something to teach us today.

In the surprising, often fiercely feminist and always fascinating *The Secret History of Home Economics*, Danielle Dreilinger traces the field’s history from Black colleges to Eleanor Roosevelt

to Okinawa, from a Betty Crocker brigade to DIY techies. These women were chemists and marketers, studied nutrition, health, and exercise, tested parachutes, created astronaut food, and took bold steps in childhood development and education. Some chose to be single, share lives with other women, or try for egalitarian marriages.

However, home economics followed the currents of American culture even as it shaped them. Dreilinger brings forward the racism within the movement along with the strides taken by women of color who were influential leaders and innovators. (Wonder why there were no Black women at Lake Placid? The Deweys barred African Americans.) She restores Black women to their true role as founders and leaders of home economics, and delves into the field’s shadow side as some of its members embraced eugenics or racial exclusion — and how pioneering women and civil rights activists fought for full participation.

This groundbreaking and engaging history restores a denigrated subject to its rightful importance, as it reminds us that everyone should learn how to cook a meal, balance their account, and fight for a better world.
